## **How Housing Works: Housing Programs in Rhode Island - Student Union Ballroom**

## **The Struggle for African American Civil Rights in 20th Century Rhode Island - SU Room 307**

"The Struggle for African American Civil Rights in 20th Century Rhode Island" is a lecture developed as part of a National Parks Service grant to research and interpret this largely unknown history. The areas of focus include fair employment, fair housing, and the deconstruction of neighborhoods and affordable housing displacement during the Urban Redevelopment era between 1955 and 1975, particularly in the College Hill, Lippitt Hill and Fox Point neighborhoods of Providence, along with the West Broadway and Memorial Blvd neighborhoods of Newport. The lecture includes many images of historic people, places and events, along with extensive images of news clippings of the day.

## **Education Advocates are Housing Advocates - Faculty Center South Dining Room**
